

Weddings at Saint Mary's Church *Simsbury, Connecticut*

This booklet provides you with information you will need to prepare for your marriage at St. Mary's. As you prepare for your meeting with the priest, please gather the following items.

1. A *recent* copy of your baptismal certificate, dated within the past six months. You may obtain this by calling the parish where you were baptized, telling the priest you are planning to be married, and asking for a new copy of your baptismal certificate.
2. Copies of your First Communion and Confirmation certificates. These do not have to be recent.

You will need to meet with the priest to fill out a premarital investigation form and prepare for the wedding ceremony. In addition to this you will be asked:

1. To attend an Engaged Couples Conference.
2. To complete and discuss a marriage survey inventory.

You will need to obtain a wedding license from the Town of Simsbury and be in contact with the Parish Music Director. If you live at a distance and cannot complete your marriage preparation at St. Mary's, you will have to complete all paper work in the parish where you reside. Since this takes extra time, do not delay. St. Mary's Parish cannot give you a wedding date until certain paper work is completed. Obtaining a venue for a reception does not assure a wedding date at St. Mary's. Below you will find other information helpful for preparing for you wedding.

Aisle/Aisle Runner

The white runner rolled out just before the bridal party approaches the altar is optional. Plastic or synthetic runners can be purchased from your florist. Many florists have heavy cloth runners that can be rented. The aisle in St. Mary's Church is sixty (60) feet long.

Altar Servers

St. Mary's generally will provide altar servers for your wedding. It is customary that the servers receive a gratuity for a wedding.

Baptismal Certificates

All Catholics are required to present a copy of his/her baptismal certificate that is less than six months old. First Communion and Confirmation certificates are also required for Catholics. Non-Catholics are asked to provide proof of baptism if they are Christian. They will also need to provide certificates attesting to their freedom to marry. These forms will be given to you by the priest or deacon who is preparing you for your wedding.

Best Man and Maid of Honor

The Best Man and the Maid of Honor are the legal witnesses to your marriage. These two witnesses are required by Church Law for the validity of your marriage. A multiplication of witnesses is to be discouraged.

Bridesmaids/Ushers/Groomsmen

Usually there are an equal numbers of bridesmaids and groomsmen, although this isn't required. The groomsmen also function as ushers.

Booklets

If you are interested in printing a booklet for the your ceremony, please contact the priest who will assist you in this.

Confetti, Rice, Birdseed, etc.

Because of the difficulty in its being removed and in some cases the danger of people slipping or falling, all such are not allowed at St. Mary's.

Communion

While we welcome all who attend your wedding regardless of their faith, Church law does not allow those who are not Catholic to receive the Eucharist. They can, however, receive a blessing at Communion time.

Flowers

In the event of multiple weddings on the same weekend, couples often share the cost of flowers, which are normally left in the church for the Sunday liturgy.

License

If you are being married at St. Mary's Church, you must have a marriage license from the Town of Simsbury: No marriage license, no wedding, no exceptions! You should bring the marriage license as Please bring the marriage license as well as the fee for the wedding the Church the night of the rehearsal.

Mass

A wedding between two Catholics is always held within the context of Mass. Other weddings are normally held in the context of the Liturgy of the Word, without the Eucharist, unless there is an overriding reason for having the wedding with a Mass.

Music

Since wedding music should enhance the Liturgy rather than detract from it, it should focus on the mystery of marriage as a sacrament that reflects the love between Christ and his Church. Accordingly, while secular music is appropriate for your reception, it is not appropriate for the wedding ceremony.

Wedding music is under the supervision of Mrs. Gena Sullivan, the church organist and Director of Music. She will make suggestions for your wedding music and let you know what is appropriate. Under the agreement with the American Guild of

Organists, our Music Director has the “Right of First Refusal.” This means that if you engage another organist, you will still have to pay the church organist, even if you do not make use of her services.

Should you choose to have other musicians participate in your wedding, they should work with Mrs. Sullivan and follow these procedures and guidelines of St. Mary's Parish.

1. When the wedding falls within a Mass, the parts of the Mass are to be sung
2. The Responsorial Psalm is sung whether or not there is a Mass
3. While popular, secular music is appropriate for your reception, it is not appropriate for the wedding ceremony
4. Within the ceremony, the music should focus on the mystery of marriage as a sacrament and upon the praise and glory of God
5. The entrance of the wedding party and of the bride form a single rite and so there is only one wedding processional

These guidelines are to be followed, even if you employ guest musicians and your own (celebrant/celebrate). Guest musicians should let Mrs. Sullivan know what music they propose to play or sing, prior to printing programs. The final determination of what is appropriate and what is not will belong to Mrs. Sullivan.

Offerings/Fees

Discuss with the priest the offering for the wedding. The wedding offering for the church includes the fee for the organist and the soloist. The wedding offering should be made by check payable to “St. Mary’s Church,” and given to the priest the night of the rehearsal along with the wedding license.

Outdoor Weddings

The Archdiocese of Hartford does not permit outdoor weddings.

Pews

There are nineteen pews on either side of the main aisle. Usually the first (and sometimes the second) are reserved for your attendants. Following that are pews designated for parents, grandparents, godparents or other special people in your lives. Most pews can comfortably seat eight, although the front pew has a supporting roof pillar and should probably only have four comfortably.

Pew Decorations

Small floral pieces or bows on the end of the center aisle pews can add a festive touch to a wedding. They can be attached with special clips available from your florist or elastic bands. Tape of any type is damaging to the finish on the pews and must never be used.

Photos/Photographers

Ask your photographer to check with the priest before the service about taking pictures of your wedding. You are, of course, welcome to take pictures in the church after the marriage ceremony.

Readers

The wedding ceremony of the Catholic Church has three readings from Sacred Scripture. The responsorial Psalm, which occurs between the first and second reading, is sung:

- An Old Testament reading
- A reading for the Epistles of the New Testament
- A Gospel reading done by a priest or deacon

The Old Testament and the reading for the Epistles are often proclaimed by family members or friends of the wedding couple. As directed by liturgical norms, these readers should be Catholics in good standing.

Readings

A booklet entitled “*Together for Life*” will be supplied to you to help you make your choices. This booklet is intended to be an aid or guide; should you have passages of scripture that are particularly meaningful to you and are appropriate to a wedding.

Receiving Line

If you are planning to have one at the church, please discuss it with your celebrant.

Rehearsal

Rehearsals for weddings are normally held at 5:00 PM the day before the weddings, unless there are extenuating circumstances.

Times of Ceremonies

Saturday Weddings are normally scheduled at 10:00 AM, 12:00 PM, and 2:00 PM. The time for weekday weddings is more flexible. There are no weddings on Sundays.

Visiting Clergy

Visiting clergy may participate in your celebration. Please discuss this with your celebrant. Should it be your desire to have a family member or friend as your celebrant, please make your wishes known early in your preparation process. All priests who are not members of the Archdiocese of Hartford must have a letter of suitability from the Bishop or Religious Superior.
